Reading

Please help your child with their reading by listening to them read every day. Reading is an essential part of the children's learning and all children should read daily! Please encourage your child to read at home and ensure that each time you read with your child, you are adding a comment for the class teacher to see.



Passwords

PE

Our P.E days this term are the same as last term: **Tuesday (outdoor) and Friday (indoor)**. Please remember to send your children in their PE kits on these PE days. Last term, we had a few children who weren't wearing the correct PE kit, we encourage this to maintain our value of PRIDE and it will also help our year 6 children prepare for secondary school, where they will also be expected to wear a particular PE kit. At Brook, children must be wearing a white t-shirt (or the colour of their house team), black shorts, trousers or leggings and plain white or black trainers with either a black or navy hoody or their school fleece/jumper. Branded clothes with large logos are NOT to be worn for PE in school.



Spring Term Curriculum:

In **English**, our core text will continue as '**Malamander**' by Thomas Taylor (fiction) and then we will begin '**Boy in the Striped Pyjamas**' by John Boyne once this is finished. We will be writing in a range of styles based around these texts.

Key Vocabulary— translucent, ammonite, coprolite, thalassic, curate, devour, grimace, ramparts

In **maths**, we will be focusing on measure, ratio, proportion, shape and problem solving. Each week we will also do times table practice, practice arithmetic questions and reasoning and problem solving.

In **science**, we will be learning all about classification and evolution and inheritance.

In **history**, we will be exploring World War II and Churchill's leadership.

In **geography**, we will be looking at the distribution of natural resources and settlements.

In **design technology**, we will be making a playground model.

In **art**, we will be using screen printing to create our own WWII style propaganda poster.

In **Spanish**, we are going to learn about the local area including places in a town and asking for directions.

In **music**, we will continue to follow Charanga to explore and appraise different styles of music.

In **computing**, we will be learning about eSafety, creating quizzes on Purple Mash and coding.

In **RE**, we will be learning about Judaism and non-religious worldviews.

In **PSHE**, we will be learning about how to stay safe online, diversity and challenging discrimination and stereotypes.
