Important Information

- Doors to Year 2 will open at 8:45am and children need to be in school by 9am at the latest. Children will come in through the Key Stage 1 cloakroom, located at the bottom of the Early Years playground, near the school kitchen.
- Children will finish at 3:30pm and they will be dismissed from the same door they arrive through. With the exception of Mr Chapman's class, who will dismiss through the outside classroom door.
- Children's bags and coats will be hung in the Year 2 cloakroom.
- Year 2 lunchtimes will be in the school hall and begin at 12:00pm.
- Reading records will need to be in school every day. We encourage children to bring these home every day so they can read at home too.
- Children come into school in their PE kits on PE days. Long hair must be tied back and jewellery removed. Staff are unable to remove earrings so please ensure these are removed for PE days. PE kit should be black pumps/trainers, a white T-Shirt, house colour T-Shirts, black or navy shorts, a plain blue/black track suit may be worn for outdoor games. Items can show the school logo.
- Please label all uniform, bags, lunchboxes, water bottles and other belongings clearly for a quick return to you if they are mislaid.

How To Help Your Child At Home



You can support your child across holidays and at home by:

- Practising times tables counting in 2's, 5's and 10's
- Finding out the properties of 2D and 3D shapes
- · Reading regularly with your child and to your child
- Trying some real-world writing that include capital letters, finger spaces, ending with a full stop, use a question mark and try joining sentences with a range of conjunctions e.g. and, but, because (cards, shopping lists, letters/emails, keep a summer diary, write summer stories)
- Practise forming letters and numbers of consistent sizes
- Practise reading and writing the remaining high frequency words
- Encourage conversation and communication with your child

Phonics

At Brook we are proud to follow the Ruth Miskin - Read, Write Inc model for phonics.

It teaches the children the sounds in English, the letters that represent them and how to form the letters when writing.

The children's reading books will be based on the letters they have learnt at each level and a small set of separately taught tricky words.

The children will have phonics every day and will be taught in learnt letter groups.

Once the children have completed all the phonics groups, they will then move into a reading comprehension group and be given an appropriate level of book.

Any Y2 child who did not pass the phonics screening in Y1, will re sit the screening in Y2 during the summer term.

Safeguarding

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility.

School is required to take action if the feel that child may not be safe. This can sometimes be upsetting but school has a 'duty of care' to keep your child / children safe.

In England, the Department for Education (DfE), provides key guidance for schools and colleges in "Keeping Children Safe In Education". This document updates yearly. Guidance for schools is also set out in "Working Together To Safeguard Children (DfE, 2023) and the safeguarding duty of schools and colleges is set out in section 175 of the Education Act 2002.

You may hear your child talking about "PANTS". This is the NSPCC simple acronym devised to teach children the underwear rule: Privates are private, Always remember your body belongs to you, No means no, Talk about secrets that upset you and Speak up – someone can help.
