1	A successful theologist in Year 1 can:
	 Explore and develop an understanding of Christianity including Jesus as founder, key religious objects (Bible, cross), the church as a place of worship and symbols Explore and understand the Christian festival of Christmas including the nativity story, and ways to celebrate Explore and develop an understanding of Islam including Muhammad as a prophet (including other prophets), key religious objects (Qur'an, prayer mat), the mosque as a place of worship and symbols Explore and develop an understanding of Sikhism including Guru Nanak as founder, key religious objects (Kara, khanda), the Gurdwara as a place of worship and symbols Develop an understanding of religious and non-religious festivals including why and how they are celebrated Raise and answer questions about each religion and share their thoughts and views in response to what they have learnt attempting to give a reason or reasons to support their view Share what they believe in or value most including beliefs and values which may reflect a religious or a non-religious view attempting to give a reason or reasons to support their view
2	A successful theologist in Year 2 can:
	 Know the main symbol and beliefs or a Humanist Know the main beliefs about Muhammad in the Islamic religion Know the story of the first revelation and the origin of the Qur'an Know the story of Easter, the events associated with the story and what Christians believe regarding the story Know and recall the story of the Good Samaritan and then identify the message or meaning from the story Explore the lives of significant individuals who have been influenced or inspired by their religious faith Raise questions and share their own views arising from and relating to what they have learnt
3	A successful theologist in Year 3 can:
	 Understand who Jesus was, where he was born, when he was born and have a basic knowledge of his life Understand the meanings of the word 'Messiah', 'crucifixion', 'Eternal life' and 'Christ' Retell the story of 'Jesus and the Baptism' and share their own views and opinions with reason as to 'who was Jesus?' Understand who Muhammed was, where he was born and the message he sent Share an understanding that drawings of Muhammed (PBUH) are not allowed Identify and show an awareness of the shahada (there is only one God) Understand the similarities of Islam to Christianity Know the name of the holy book 'The Quran' and the important message it delivers Identify significant beliefs that most Sikhs hold about God Understand that Guru Nanak was the founder of the religion and understand where he was born and who he was Show awareness that Sikhs believe in ten Gurus Retell the story of Guru Nanak's disappearance in the river Understand 'The Lord's prayer' Understand the Al Fatiha prayer in the Quran Show their opinions and views — Is one prayer more than another? Raise questions and share their own views arising from and relating to what they have learnt

A successful theologist in Year 4 can: Know and recall Muslims beliefs regarding the Qur'an and revelations Know and recall a range of stories which are significant for people with a religious or a non-religious worldview and reflect on the stories, raise questions and have opportunities to consider and talk about what meaning or message a story may be expressing Identify and sequence the main events in the story of Jesus and Zacchaeus and identify the meaning of this story Understand and share their own thoughts in response to what they have learnt about Jesus' teachings about kindness and love Know, discuss and reflect on significant beliefs associated with being a prophet in contrast to beliefs associated with being an incarnation of God Know, discuss and reflect on different beliefs and views associated with miracles, life after death and salvation within different religions and worldviews Understand the main beliefs of a Humanist Raise and share their own views around what they have learnt about Know the difference between an atheist and an agnostic Recall the names and symbols associated with Christianity and at least three other principal religions and nonreligious worldviews Raise questions and share their own views arising from and relating to what they have learnt 5 A successful theologist in Year 5 can: Know the story of Adam and Eve and the fall and to recall details and express their own opinions about the story, linked to the original sin Know the salvation story including concepts of atonement, reconciliation, and express their own opinions Know stories about the Prophet Muhammed's life focussed on the beginning of Islam, including the saving of To identify significant Sikh beliefs associated with reincarnation and share their own thoughts and views in response to what they have learnt To have a knowledge and understanding of fasts and festivals associated with religious and non-religious world view and associated stories Raise questions and share their own views arising from and relating to what they have learnt 6 A successful theologist in Year 6 can: Know and be able to recall significant events in religious stories (Muhammad & the taking of Mekkah, God's promise to Abraham and Moses, The Good Samaritan) Discuss and share their own thoughts and views in response to religious stories Pupils should explain and give reasons to support their views on wealth/money, anger/force, souls/afterlife Know beliefs and practices related to worship (petitionary prayer, devotional prayer) Reflect and discuss their own views relating to humanism and non-religious world views Raise questions and share their own views arising from and relating to what they have learnt
